Nāu te rourou, nāku te rourou, ka ora ai te iwi

With your food basket and my food basket the people will thrive

1:30pm | Arrival and catch up before the formal welcome

1:50pm | Welcome on to the Marae

Manuhiri (visitors) should congregate at the Waharoa (gateway) of the marae, in formation of women at the front and men at the back behind the women. You will await the Karanga or call of welcome from the host Kaikaranga. You enter the marae Atea as waewae tapu (sacred feet) and will hear the call of the Karanga.

The process of Powhiri lifts the tapu of the manuhiri and consequently they become tangata whenua for the period of their stay.

2:00pm | Powhiri

The Powhiri recognises the coming together of two groups that are separated not only physically but also spiritually. It is a profound acknowledgement that we are all creatures of a spiritual realm.

2:45pm | Ngāti Whatua Orakei – their Story

Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei will share their history and the stories of the marae. We will learn how Māori principles link into Health & Safety, and deepen our knowledge of the Wharenui (meeting house).



3:15pm | Break for Kai (food)

Mini spring rolls, mini assorted pies, soup & freshly baked bread, fruit platter, sponge cake, freshly baked scones with condiments, tea, coffee, juice, chilled water.

3:30pm | Mahi Haumarua Aotearoa (WorkSafe) Maruiti team

The WorkSafe Maruiti team will talk us through their engagement strategy with Māori as they are focusing on Māori health and safety needs in the face of data demonstrating a disproportionate impact on Māori in our workplaces. They will touch on a few examples of their work in the manufacturing sector in the regions as well.



4:30pm | Makere Carroll – Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori (Māori Language Commission)

In 2021, over 1 million people participated in Te Wā Tuku Reo Māori – the Māori Language Moment. Organisations made up the majority of participants, with over 30% being workplaces. We know te reo Māori is important in workplaces at all levels and builds cultural capability; it's also a great way to bring colleagues together. The normalisation and revitalisation of te reo Māori happens in all spaces, from small towns to cities, in schools, workplaces and communities. This presentation will explore the importance of te reo Māori in the workplace and help those who are looking to increase its use at work.
