national and regional prison education projects. This was a real insight into what happens in prison in regard to retraining the offenders, so they can adjust when they integrate back into society.

Our first COVID webinar was Michael Hempseed. Given the situation and the uncertainties around what was going to happen etc, it was good to have Michael presenting. From this webinar Michael has presented a 16-part series which you can watch in your own time.

During lockdown we also had another webinar on Hazardous substance.
